TOM'S BIO

Tom McLaughlin apprenticed in the early 90s with Master Craftsman P.A. "Pug" Moore of Rocky Mount, NC. Over his 30+ year career he has designed and built a myriad of custom pieces for clients seeking to own pieces that are as much a work of art as they are functional.

As a 25-year member of the New Hampshire Furniture Masters, and former Chairman, his work has become recognizable for its dramatic use of figured wood, creating a sense of movement in each piece.

Tom can be seen on repeat episodes hosting Classic Woodworking with Fine Woodworking on PBS TV, and he's a frequent contributor to Fine Woodworking Magazine.

In 2016, Tom shifted his focus from commission work to teaching on his Epic Woodworking platform. He and his wife Kris enjoy furthering the craft by providing resources and instruction for all levels through a free weekly livestream called Shop Night Live on YouTube, Online courses and In-shop classes at his shop in Canterbury, NH.

They also offer a community Membership experience called The Neighborwood which brings together woodworkers from all over the world with the goal of expanding skills and inspiring creativity.

Skagit Wood Expo Recap

The Skagit Wood Expo was held on April 6-7 at the Skagit County Fairgrounds in Mt. Vernon. It attracted a large number of exhibits and vendors this year, covering everything from log milling, chain saw carving, all manner of woodworking demos and a wide range of wooden crafts for exhibit or sale. NCWA had a large booth this year, manned by about 30 NCWA members. Although the weather was more on the "liquid sunshine" rather than the "blue sky" side, attendance was good. Barry Tonkin said that total NCWA sales were \$725. Jerry Couchman donated one of his boxes to the silent auction, which fetched \$125. Toys for Tots donations were \$280. We also gained six new members, 5 were from the Wood Expo.

We have 6 new members as of today, with 5 from the Wood Expo. The guy that just joined, Bob Barnard, was a member of our club in the 80's and decided to join after seeing an article about our participation in Wood Expo.

Many thanks to all the members that helped with logistics, setup, tear down, woodworking demos, and that brought items for exhibit or for sale.

Anyone within the chat group can reply with their inputs - it works just like email. And it's free!

The general guideline for discussions is to keep topics limited to woodworking, the woodworking community, or NCWA. General topic guidelines:

- General woodworking knowledge sharing
- Asking questions and offering advice
- Safety tips
- Woodworking news
- Buying/selling woodworking tools or materials

• Announcements (classes, self-promotion, sales, gatherings, conferences) of significant interest to the NCWA members. If in doubt, contact the admins first!

If you are new to NCWA or have not yet signed up and wish to participate in the NCWA Chat Mail, here is how to go about getting signed up and on board. And don't worry - the mailing list is not shared or sold to advertisers or other outside groups, so you will only see the NCWA chat communications.

Instructions for subscribing

- To sign up, go to the NCWA website (<u>https://ncwawood.org</u>) and click the "NCWA Chat" link -- it will download or open a PDF that explains the NCWA Chat. Read that PDF in its entirety (it's short), and send an email to the address in the PDF (<u>ncwa.chat.help@gmail.com</u>) to request to be added to the chat group.
- 2. Once you've been added to the group (admins might be busy, so give us a bit of time), you should receive an email to get started.

Simply send an email to <u>ncwa-chat@googlegroups.com</u> to start a conversation or reply to someone else.

Services and other info

There's a small database hosted on Airtable, an online database service <u>located here</u>. Near the top of the page, please note the 6 tabs across the top: "Commercial Resources", which list both physical and online businesses that offer services that NCWA members might wish to know about. "Educational Resources", which is a table of links to various media (videos, PDFs, websites, etc.) that are full of education, instruction, things to look out for, and wisdom (also spelled "oops"). "Members Recommend" is a list of folks who have voiced these various commercial and educational recommendations, in case you want to reach out to them with additional questions or just want to tell them thanks for something if it was useful to you. "Recommendation Topics" is the list of commercial resources, but broken down by common topic categories. "Locations" – addresses and phone numbers for brick and mortar enterprises, and also one record labeled "online" for all the web resources. Lastly, "Subjects" is a topic breakdown of the Educational Resources. Right now, this tab isn't very useful, but as more info is added, it will become a good referential index.

Presentation

Panel Discussion - Comparison Discussion for Small, Medium and Large Format Shops

- Loren Steele: Small approximately 300 square feet
 - Limited by max size allowable by Ferndale
 - Mostly makes small items like boxes; would need to redesign layout for larger items like furniture
- David Shull: Medium approximately 480 square feet
 - Mostly makes things for his house like furniture and cabinets, but will make whatever he wants
- Jerry Couchman: Large approximately 1500+ square feet
 - \circ Built a shop and then added on to it
 - Makes furniture and boxes
 - \circ $\,$ Teaches a live-edge box class and can fit several students in his shop $\,$

Main Work Area

- Small: Stacked
 - Adjusts shop to fit the project. Everything has casters except for main workbench; has other tables on casters that are multi-use, such as for sanding and as an outfeed table; another table has benchtop planer; table is multi-layer - one table stacked on another and attached using togglebolts - can take the top off table off to easily access the benchtop joiner in the middle layer; uses downdraft table for dust control; for tools that make a lot of dust, he will often wheel the tool outside
- Medium: Workbench
 - Saving space by making pieces multifunctional, like a torsion box that is also an outfeed table that is also used for assembly, finishing, storage underneath; Uses rolling pins for outfeed table
 - Outfeed table is not quite long enough for a long piece of wood, so David has little drawer boxes fit with rolling pins to increase the size of his outfeed table
 - Drawers have 2 notches. One notch is deeper so the rolling pin can be stored inside the closed drawer. The rolling pin sits in the higher notches when in use.
- Large: Multiple work benches, mainly for students

Dust Collection

• Small: Did not want to use filters or filter bags. Instead uses a Thien-style cyclone separator that fills a drum (lined with a trash bag) with dust and chips

- Medium: Grizzly dust collector, cyclone chip collector using trash can. Tools that make a lot of dust and are hard to move are closest to the dust collector. Other tools are farther away and don't get hooked up to it.
- Large: Built shop from scratch and was able to customize the dust collection uses Oneida system that separates dust from chips; system is separated from his main shop space but return air is pretty loud; added floor sweeps later; would like more Festool shop vacs only has one so he uses it for smaller tools like routers and random orbital sanders

Wood Storage

- Small: Probably the biggest drawback to a small shop stores wood in the rafters, in corners, and in the garage
- Medium: racks on the ceiling, wood under a bench, in every space available
- Large: racks on the wall of main shop, loft in the tractor storage space, and stacks vertically against the wall

• If wood is leaning against the wall for too long, it can develop a bend

Tool Storage

- Small: French cleats on the walls with shelves and racks easy to move if needed. The things he uses most frequently are at arm's reach; less frequently used tools are lower in milk crates, up high, or steps away and are easier to move when needed
 - Hand tools are all battery operated; drills are located near drill press along with bits, circular saw is in a milk crate under the bench because it's rarely used
- Medium: Built tool chest next to bench; each drawer holds different set of tools takes out the drawer when needed and puts it back when he's done
 - Stores small power tools where he needs them (like routers near router table, drilling stuff near drill press where all the bits are stored)
- Large: Built work bench first and built chest next with goal of all hand tools within easy reach of bench, marking and measuring tools go in a drawer under outfeed table the secret is putting them back in the same spot
 - Small corded tools stored in rolling work benches and scattered in other places around the shop
 - Has dedicated battery charging station

Questions:

- Tool acquisition strategy:
 - Loren does a lot of research and price comparison to decide if he should get a cheaper tool first
 - $_{\odot}$ If it's a tool that you're going to use a lot, buy the best one you can afford
- Flooring: all have concrete, some mats

- o Stall mats
- Security
 - o Jerry has an alarm system
 - All keep their door locked
 - Barry uses cameras
- Heat
 - Loren put in heated floors hydronic heating
 - o David a few electric heaters and a propane heater
 - Jerry uses the same system as his house using propane, keeps it in the mid- to upper- 50s, and wears layers; but would use a heat pump if he could build a shop again
 - Several members use wood stoves
- Finishing -
 - Jerry built his shop to have a finishing room but it became a bathroom, now uses wipe-on oil products so dust isn't as big a concern; will put things in his office area for drying because it stays warmer
 - David and Loren use his outfeed table and wipe-on finishes so don't need to worry about spray fumes
- File Cabinets good for tools and magazines
- Has anyone built a swing arm for vacuum or electrical?
 - One member has; also Popular Woodworking has a plan for it
 - Loren has a similar setup for his shopvac- on a platform with casters and the hose and power cord are looped over the truss and he can reach about half his shop that way
